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Introduction

This Installation Guide illustrates the procedures for installing the HP 3000 Series 939KS/959KS/969KS and 979KS computer. The contents of this guide include:

- 1. Overview of System Installation a brief description of the installation procedure.
- 2. Overview of System Power/Data Cabling A reference figure showing the basic power and data connections for the core system (System Processing Unit and Console).
- 3. Installation Steps A series of figures showing each step in the installation process. Brief explanations below each figure provide additional information.

Overview of System Installation

1. Console, Keyboard, and UPS (Uninterruptible Power System):

- A. Connect the console data cable to the "Console" port on the system core I/O card.
- B. Plug the console power cable into a UPS power receptacle.
- C. Connect the keyboard cable to the keyboard connector on the console.
- D. Connect the UPS data cable between the "UPS" connector on the system and the appropriate data connector on the UPS.

2. Local Area Network (LAN):

A. Connect the LAN to either the "THINLAN" or "AUI" connector on the system core I/O card.

3. SCSI Cabling (Single-ended & Fast/Wide Differential):

- A. Connect a high-density Single-ended (SE) SCSI cable or terminator to the "SE SCSI" connector on the system core I/O card.
- B. Connect a Fast/Wide Differential SCSI cable or terminator to the "F/W DIFF SCSI" connector on the system core I/O card.

4. Internal or External Modem:

- A. Connect a line access module to the "INTERNAL MODEM" connector on the core I/O card. If using the internal modem, do not connect an external modem. Proceed to the "Power Connections" step.
- B. If not using the internal modem, connect an external modem to the "EXTERNAL MODEM" connector on the system core I/O card.

5. Summary of System Connections:

- A. Before powering on the system, confirm that all system data and power cables are correctly connected.
- B. Check that all connectors and plugs are firmly seated.

6. Stabilizer Block (Chock Block):

A. Roll the system cabinet onto the stabilizer block in the desired location to prevent the system cabinet from being inadvertently moved around.

7. Power Connections:


- A. Plug the system power cable into the appropriate power receptacle at the rear of the Uninterruptible Power System (UPS).
- B. Plug the UPS power cable into wall power.

8. Power On:

- A. Turn on the Uninterruptible Power System (UPS).
- B. Turn on all peripherals
- C. Turn on the system by setting the key switch to the "ON" position.
- D. Refer to the Operator's Handbook that came with your system for operator information.


Overall View of System Power/Data Cabling

The figure below shows an overview of the power and data cabling for the system (SPU), console, and the optional UPS, and is intended for reference only. To proceed with actual installation of the system, start at the page titled "Standard Console, Keyboard, and Optional UPS".



Console, Keyboard, and UPS


(**NOTE:** The A2994A UPS shown in the example is supported only on models 939KS/959KS/969KSx00 and 969KSx20. The rear panels on the 18kKvA and 3.0KvA UPS for model 979KS have a different appearance but use a similar data connection.)



- A. Connect the console data cable to the "Console" port on the system core I/O card.
- B. Plug the console power cable into a UPS power receptacle.
- C. Connect the keyboard cable to the keyboard connector on the console.
- D. Connect the UPS data cable between the "UPS" connector on the system and the appropriate data connector on the UPS.

NOTE: Do not plug the UPS into a power receptacle at this time.

Local Area Network (LAN)




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Connect the LAN to either the "THINLAN" or "AUI" connector on the system core I/O card.

CAUTION


The ThinLAN and AUI LAN can not be connected at the same time. Only one LAN connector can be active at a time. The AUI connector is selected as the default connector. If you need to have the ThinLAN connector active, contact your local Hewlett Packard Service or Sales representative.

SCSI Cabling (Single-ended & Fast/Wide Differential)




- kh3iC05a
- A. Connect a high-density Single-Ended (SE) SCSI cable or terminator to the "SE SCSI" connector on the system core I/O card.
- B. Connect a Fast/Wide Differential SCSI cable or terminator to the "F/W DIFF SCSI" connector on the system core I/O card.

Internal or External Modem



- A. Connect a LAM (Line Access Module an adaptor for connecting the modem to the local country phone system) to the "INTERNAL MODEM" connector on the system core I/O card. If using an internal modem, do not connect an external modem. Proceed to the "Power Connections" step.
- B. If not using the internal modem, connect an external modem to the "EXTERNAL MODEM" connector on the system core I/O card.


Summary of System Connections



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The figure above is a summary of all the system connections previously described. You should use this figure to make a quick check of all connections you have made to ensure that they are correct before connecting power cabling.

Stabilizer Block (Chock Block)




The stabilizer block (or chock block) is used to prevent the system cabinet from being inadvertently moved around. The block can be placed under either the front or rear wheels.

- 1. Position the stabilizer block at the desired location for the system cabinet.
- 2. Roll the system cabinet onto the stabilizer block until the front (or rear) wheels fall into the notch in the stabilizer block.


Power Connections

Models 939KS/959KS/969KSx00/969KSx20




-
- A. Plug the system power cable into the power receptacle closest to the upper-left corner at the rear of the Uninterruptible Power System (UPS).
- B. Plug the UPS power cable into wall power.

Model 979KS



- A. Plug the system power cable into the 20A power receptacle at the rear of the Uninterruptible Power Supply (UPS).
- B. Plug in the UPS power cable to a dedicated 20A circuit.


POWER-ON: First, Turn On the UPS and All Peripherals




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- A. Turn on the UPS.
- B. Turn on all peripherals. Be sure all peripherals are on with no error indications.

Then, Turn On the System

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- C. Turn on the system by setting the key switch to the "ON" position.
- D. Refer to the **Operator's Handbook** that came with your system for operator information.
